In the 2001 Major League Baseball All-Star game, Alex Rodriguez was selected to be the starting shortstop for the American League. Before the game, Rodriguez asked his manager, Joe Torre if he could switch positions with Cal Ripkin Jr. This selfless act by Rodriguez allowed the future Hall of Famer to play the first inning at shortstop, which was the position Ripkin had played for the majority of his career. Rodriguez showed tremendous humility by doing something special for a teammate. Ripkin was extremely grateful for the gesture, saying "It felt good getting that glimpse, and going back in time. I did play most of my career from that perspective."

Being a good teammate is a valuable asset for any coach. A good teammate seeks to make the team successful by putting the needs of the team ahead of individual achievement.
